No unquoted investments are permitted. Target portfolio of 20-30 quoted companies.







Monthly Commentary

SmallCap enjoyed a strong 2019. The asset class was one of the top performers globally alongside the S&P 500, both of which delivered returns of +29% (in local currency terms). This marked a good end to the decade for SmallCap, which outperformed LargeCap in eight of the past ten years.

Few investors forecast such a strong year for equity markets after the declines of 2018. Yet markets responded positively to further support from Central Banks and tepid economic data that was neither too hot nor worryingly cold. Meanwhile, the great political risks – namely the Trade War and Brexit – showed tentative signs of progress towards the end of the year.

During December, the NAV of the share class increased by 4.4% in Sterling terms, 0.9% ahead of the MSCI Europe Small Cap benchmark index. For the year as a whole, the NAV increased by 31.5%, a strong outperformance of 10.3%.

The strongest contribution during the month came from **Restore**, the document management business, which benefitted from election induced optimism and a well-received Capital Markets presentation. **4imprint**, the supplier of promotional merchandise, also benefitted from a shift in sentiment post the election. **Hilton Foods**, the meat packer in the UK, rose following more positive sentiment towards UK shares following the general election result.

The weakest contribution came from **Reply**, a network of specialised IT services companies, which paused for breath in December after a strong run. **CTS Eventim**, the provider of ticketing services in Europe, and **VZ Holding**, the Swiss wealth manager, also experienced profit taking after good periods of performance.

Commentators are busy gazing into their crystal balls attempting to predict what the New Year has in store for investors. History suggests that this is a difficult task. Attempting to forecast the direction of global macro forces can be akin to reading the tea leaves – and both economists and taseographers (those who read tea leaves) have a habit of leaving enough room in their predictions to claim that they were “right” after the event.

We do not spend time trying to make such predictions. Macro events that influence markets, such as those currently taking place in Iran and Iraq, sit outside our sphere of competence and are virtually impossible to predict. Rather, we spend our time meeting and listening to our companies. In our experience, this is where we can begin to understand the true drivers of growth that are so important to the trajectory of long-term investment returns.
